Critically analyze themes in course readings that inform the nature and variety of human experience (such as education/literacy, identity and intersectionality, civil disobedience/violence, prejudice, African heritage, political platforms, nationalism, feminism, family relationships, religion, argument and language).
- 5. Engage analytically with a wide range of literature by African American authors, including a diversity of genres and modalities.
- 6. Use reading and writing to generate and analyze ideas.
- 7. Offer and explain relevant evidence to unpack reasoning in writing and discussion.
- 8. Collaborate respectfully and productively with others on intellectually and emotionally challenging topics.
- 9. Critically analyze audience in relationship to course readings (such as original historical audiences, contemporary audiences, developmental audiences, etc.).
- 10. Reflect on the course experience, including topics such as personal growth, connections between course content and other courses/areas of life, the implications of course readings for current events, etc.
