- 5. Engage in a writing community by sharing and critiquing their writing in peer workshops.
- 6. Continue discovering and developing their unique voices through peer editing and workshops.
- 7. Critique revisions of writing from peers and provide constructive feedback based on elements of good writing.
- 8. Analyze revisions of their own work based on self-critique, elements of good writing and responses from peers and instructor.
- 9. Prepare a piece of revised original writing for publication.
