Course Objectives

- 1. Describe the importance of European, and especially English traditions and experience on the colonial and early-American military establishments.
- 2. Analyze and explain the reasons for the American victory in the American Revolution.
- 3. Explain the long-term impact of the American Revolution on the American military system.
- 4. Identify and explain the factors that shaped the development of the American military establishment, 1783-1815.
- 5. Discuss and analyze the shortcomings of the American military establishment in the War of 1812.
- 6. Identify and explain the factors that shaped the development of the American military establishment, 1815-1860.
- 7. Explain and analyze the importance of the following factors in the outcome of the Mexican War: (1) the development of a joint Army-Navy amphibious doctrine; (2) the employment of volunteers rather than militia; (3) the contributions of officers of the regular army; (4) Winfield Scott's campaign to take Mexico City; and (5) the role played by politics in the coming of the conflict, its prosecution and its conclusion.
- 8. Identify the new technologies employed during the Civil War, and sketch their impact on tactics and strategy.
- 9. Describe the importance of the Union Navy in the conduct of the civil war.
- 10. Describe the gradual changes in Union strategy between 1861 and 1864 and explain the reasons behind this shift in strategy.
- 11. Identify and explain the factors that shaped the development of the American military establishment, 1865-1917
- 12. Describe and analyze the reasons for the problems encountered by the American military in the prosecution of the Spanish-American War.
- 13. Explain American strategic thought regarding the Great War and describe the role this strategy played in the American conduct of the war.
- 14. Describe and explain the reasons for the problems encountered by the American Army in combat on the Western Front, 1917-1918.
- 15. Describe the contributions of the United States Navy to Allied victory in the Great War.
- 16. Identify and explain the factors that shaped the development of the American military establishment, 1919-1941.
- 17. Identify the major factors that shaped the conduct World War Two in Europe and evaluate their significance.
- 18. Identify the major factors that shaped the strategic bombing campaign in Europe and evaluate that campaign's success.
- 19. Identify the major factors that shaped the conduct of World War Two in the Pacific and evaluate the significance.
