Proposed Start Semester: Winter 2018
Course Description: In this course students continue to develop intermediate-level Spanish language and communication skills. Particular emphasis is placed on the interpretation and discussion of Spanish short stories, as well as the development of written expression and speaking proficiency. Intermediatelevel grammatical structures, vocabulary, and expressions are introduced and practiced. Cultural lessons are also included to provide context for selected stories. This interactive course is taught in Spanish and active student participation is required.

## Course Objectives

1. Demonstrate mastery of various verb forms, including simple and compound structures, of the indicative and subjunctive moods.
2. Demonstrate mastery of the pronoun system, distinguishing between subject, accusative, dative and prepositional pronouns.
3. Consistently apply rules of gender/number and subject/verb agreement.
4. Conjugate and apply the present perfect and pluperfect indicative forms in written and spoken contexts. Recognize and conjugate the present perfect and pluperfect subjunctive forms.
5. Discern when to utilize the indicative versus subjunctive mood in subordinate clauses.
6. Narrate in the present and past tenses while properly applying the Spanish verb system at the intermediate level.
7. Use past participles as adjectives to describe nouns and with "haber" to form complex verb structures.
8. Form and apply the passive voice using "ser" with past participles, the passive voice with "se", and "se" impersonal.
9. Recognize and apply the dative of unplanned occurrences, the no fault "se".
10. Express hypothetical or contrary to fact situations using the imperfect subjunctive and conditional in "si" clauses.
11. Communicate facts and ideas and express thoughts and opinions on various topics at the intermediate level.
12. Develop intermediate-level reading and listening comprehension skills.
13. Participate in simple, direct conversations based on various cultural topics and a variety of Spanish short stories.
14. Respond extemporaneously to questions and engage in spontaneous intermediate-level conversation.
15. Translate reading selections from Spanish to English and transform English phrases into Spanish equivalents.
16. Recognize and identify the cultural and historical contexts of selected short stories.
17. Read and interpret a variety of Spanish short stories, summarize plots, and interpret themes.
18. Recognize and utilize literary vocabulary, idiomatic expressions, and a variety of transitional words and phrases.
19. Construct a well organized piece of writing with a clear focus, introduction, conclusion, and supporting details.
20. Compare and contrast short stories with respect to point of view, narration, symbolism, historical context and themes.
